PARTY VOTES ON KEY LGBTIQ+ TEXTS 2019-2024

In this table, the Members of European Parliament (MEPs) for each political party in your country are distributed in five voting categories depending on how they voted on nine key texts regarding the fundamental rights of LGBTIQ+ people. MEPs vote either 'for' or 'against' or they abstain (see next page). The most supportive MEPs who always voted 'for' all the texts are in category 1 while the least supportive MEPs who always voted 'against' all the texts are in category 5. Depending on the number of MEPs in each category, the national political parties are labelled as supportive of (green), unclear about their support to (yellow) or opposed to (red) the fundamental rights of LGBTIQ+ people.

The following table shows the individual votes of the Members of European Parliament (MEPs) from your country on the nine key texts regarding the fundamental rights of LGBTIQ+ people adopted by the European Parliament between 2019 and 2024. For each vote, the MEP can vote 'for' the text, 'against' it or they can abstain. If the MEP is absent for the vote, this is registered as a 'no vote'. Based on their votes, each MEP is placed in one of the five voting categories mentioned in the previous table.
